DR. PEARCE ON CONSUMPTION.

"Consumption," said Dr. E. A. Pearce of the Portland Sanatorium, at Assembly Wednesday, "is a preventable disease. It can be detected by an absolutely sure test and can be cured in seventy-five per cent of cases.

Dr. Pearce continued, "I was one of the 6,000 delegates to the International

Tuberculosis Congress at Washington, D. C., last year. The congress has gathered statistics which are practically invaluable to the world and many interesting papers were read, showing the marvelous discoveries recently made. The death rate from tuberculosis is found to be at least one hundred and sixty four in one hundred thousand, and in 1906 the United States alone lost upwards of one hundred and thirty eight thousand lives from the disease. One of the disputed questions settled by the congress was the fact that tuberculosis can be contracted from the use of milk or meat from a diseased cow.

One of the great causes of infection and spread of the disease is flies. Kissing is also very dangerous. Three million dollars were appropriated last year by the state legislatures for the erection and maintenance of sanitariums. Seventeen states already have them in operation. By these means, the spread of the disease has been checked somewhat. Pennsylvania has made the greatest progress, in the last ten years, reducing her death rate ten per cent"—Oregon University Weekly.
