

WRESTLING MATCHES

On Saturday evening Chemawa's class of wrestlers gave an exhibition in the school gymnasium. They wrestled under the amateur rules. Dennis Harnden has charge of the class and deserves great credit for the proficiency and skill displayed by the wrestlers.

The first match was between Edward Lynch of Alaska and David Graham of California—middle weight class. Lynch took the first fall in three minutes and five seconds by a head hold. The second bout there was no fall, and the third bout no fall was secured. The match was awarded to Edward Lynch.

The second match was between Wm. Mose of California and Ralph Allen of Washington. Ralph Allen was awarded the first fall by a half Nelson further arm hold, but was not secured until after five minutes and thirty-five seconds. The second bout resulted in no fall and the third bout had the same result, so the match was awarded to Ralph Allen. This was a welter weight match.

The next match was also of the same class, being between Amos Smoker of California and Philip Moss of Montana. In this match Amos Smoker got a fall in the second bout after three minutes and fourteen seconds of wrestling, who won by means of a body hold.

Then Dennis Harnden agreed to wrestle Alvin Pollock, Levi Sortor and Albert Garry, to get three falls out of each or nine falls in all, within a time limit of thirty minutes of actual wrestling. He got the first fall from Pollock in one minute and thirteen seconds by a body hold. Second fall from Pollock in twenty seconds by a head hold, and the third fall from Pollock by an arm lock hold in one minute and eleven seconds. Then he got the first fall from Sortor in one

minute and two seconds by a double body hold. The second fall from Sortor in twenty-nine seconds by a head lock and bar hold and the third fall from Sortor in two minutes and fifty five seconds by an arm grapevine hold.

Then after a couple of minutes of wrestling Dennis "threw up the sponge" as he had one of his ribs (an old break) dislocated. This was done while wrestling in the first bout with Pollock but he gritily continued until the pain became unendurable.

After this match Albert Garry wrestled Amos Smoker. Amos secured the first fall by a body hold in two minutes and ten seconds. The second fall was awarded to Garry who secured it in one minute and eighteen seconds by an arm grapevine hold. The third was awarded to Smoker, who obtained it by a bar hold in two minutes and thirteen seconds.

Then Henry Dillstrom wrestled Levi Sortor. The first fall was awarded to Dillstrom after five minutes and forty-four seconds by a toe hold, and the second fall to Dillstrom in a minute, being secured by an arm hold.

A large party witnessed the wrestling, among whom were between forty and fifty people from Salem.
