THE MARATHON.

Frank Dan represented the school in the Marathon race which was run at Portland last Friday evening. There were entered fifteen Marathon runners from various parts of the United States and Canada. Among them Burns of Canada, who ran in the London Marathon, and Sisto who defeated Durango in Italy.

Frank is to be very greatly commended for the run that he made and had he not made the mistake of having on spike shoes when he made the run which retired him at the end of the 22nd mile we feel sure he would have at least come in second if not first in the race.

Frank's part of the race is best told by the Oregonian and the Telegram clippings from these papers given below:

"From the sixth to the 18th mile Burn and Dorris fought it out for supremacy, and it was a glorious contest of endurance. Each man alternately set a pace and all this time Frank Dan, an Indian boy from Chemawa Training School, plodded along in third position, scarcely more than a lap behind. The Indian was forced to drop out after 22 miles had been run, for he was troubled with

his left leg after 19 miles had been completed."—The Oregonian.

"The Indian, Frank Dan, ran like a clock until his leg failed him. He ran 18 miles, 11 laps to the miles, and never varied more than two seconds on a lap."—The Telegram.
