NEZ PERCE SUBSCRIBE AND WILL START BUSINESS AT LAPWAI.

A bank in which the principal stockholders are Indians of the Nez Perce tribe is to be started at Lapwai, Idaho.

The incorporators of the bank are Corbett Lawyer, a white man; Edward Riboyu, Indian interpreter at Fort Lapwai, and Thomas Moore, another white man. The bank has a capital of \$15,000, \$12,00 of which is subscribed by Indians. All the directors, with one exception, will be Indians.

This Indian bank, which is the only one of its kind in the country, has been incorporated for the purpose of taking care of the funds in the shape of annuities which come to the Indians.

This year there will be \$120,000 of government money for distribution among the Indians as interest on the money owed to the Indians for the sale of their land, and an additional \$25,000, which is the interest on the money owed by the government for the Nez Perce forest reserve.
