The dairy boys have finished planting about 5 acres of kale on the school farm, close to the dairy barn. This has been demonstrated by our small plot last year to be our best forage crop. "All through the past winter our herd was furnished green food from this prolific plant.

The school room gardens have been planted in a plot which lies between the school house and the hospital building. Now the question is which grade will take the prize for the neatest and best kept gardens and which pupils will see the blue ribbon floating from their garden as the best kept individual plot.

The prospects for the fall football schedule are excellent and Chemawa expects to have a good strong team in the field this fall to contest for gridiron honors. Among the teams with whom we are arranging for schedules are the University

of Oregon, Oregon Agricultural College, Catholic Young Men's Club of Portland, and Pacific University.

The orchard on the east side of the railroad track has been sown in vetch this year instead of cultivating. There is an excellent stand of this staple. Water pipes have been run to the orchard and later in the season the stock hogs will be turned in to fatten. The orchard gives every promise of a record breaking crop of prunes, apples, pears and cherries.

The domestic science building is nearly ready for occupancy. The painters are now busy putting on the finishing touches and then the sewing room and dressmaking department will move over to their new quarters. The plumbers and electricians have yet to complete their work in the building. This will give the school what it has needed for years, quarters for their girls' industries.

A large consignment of miscellaneous goods has been received at Chemawa from Siletz Indian School, which has been abolished, and orders issued for the turning over of the supplies to Chemawa. The first consignment of about 10,000 lbs. arrived here this week. This supplements a like consignment which was received earlier in the season from the Grande Ronde Boarding School, which has also been closed.

The baseball teams are now down to business and expect to win their full quota of games the balance of the season. Tomorrow they go to Dallas to play the team there. Then they will play the University of Oregon, Multnomah Athletic Club and Mount Angel College. The University boys defeated us on our grounds at the early season game, but the boys expect to redeem their good name in the return game at Eugene.
