### MERITED PRAISE.

They discoursed music at different places in town throughout the day and till late at night; leaving for the school again early Sunday morning. A great deal of credit is due to Bandmaster Charles Larsen for their efficiency in handling music. They are a gentlemanly, well mannered set of boys and will long be remembered by those whom they came in contact with.

In the afternoon, the ball game be-

tween Stayton and the Indian team from Chemawa, drew more than a thousand people. The Indians won the game easily with a score of 11 to 5. Teabo, the famous Indian pitcher who went east a few years ago and joined the St. Louis nationals was on the mound here and had the Stayton team completely at his mercy. After the ball game came the foot races, wheelbarrow race, etc., and the boys from Chemawa were successful in most of these events.—Stayton Mail.
