Dr. Charles E. McChesney, special agent of the Interior Department, is making a general inspection of the school at Chemawa. He has just completed the inspection of several schools in Washington state.

Dr. McChesney is one of the old-timers in the Indian Service, having been agent among the Sioux for many years, extending back into the '70's and understands Indian character, as well as any man in the United States.

During the time of the Sioux treaty in the latter '80's, Dr. McChesney and Inspector McLaughlin were two men who stood out for the rights of the Sioux, and when an effort was made to have the Sioux Indians sign a treaty which was considered unjust to the Indians, it was impossible to get the required three-fourths signatures to make it a law, but when the law was changed so as to meet the wishes of the Indians as outlined by the Doctor and Inspector McLaughlin, then agent of the Standing Rock, the treaty was promptly ratified by the Indians.—Oregonian.
