INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION.

(At the State Teachers Assembly).

PENDLETON. Or. March 24—(Special)—Industrial education will soon become a required part of every school curriculum in the state of Oregon if the movement started today by Professor E. D. Ressler, of the Oregon Agricultural College, meets with the success that is promised. Professor Ressler's proposal was received with such favor by the Eastern division of the State Teachers Association, which is meeting jointly with the Inland Empire Association, that a committee was ordered appointed which is to confer with a similar committee from the Western division of the State association. These committees will be expected to make a report to a joint meeting of the two associations to be held in Portland during the holidays.
