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FARM NOTES.

The farmers finished seeding Monday. They have sown the largest acreage ever put in on the Chemawa farm. The crops are looking fine and this splendid growing weather is making record growths. The farmers claim a model field just south of the walk to the electric car line, but they had to work for it, going over it five times. John Robinson made a record one day sowing; he sowed two and one-half acres in one hour and three-quarters with a six-foot drill. W. Basset also has a breakneck pace for harrowing; he got over eleven acres in one forenoon.

The first cutting of vetch was made last week. The rye around the vetch is now nearly two feet high.

The Farmers have a splendid stand of clover sown this spring. They are now breaking ground for this year's potato crop.
