They turned out 18,726 feet of lumber during the first winter and last month they turned out 18,937 feet more and 27,000 cedar shingles, so that they now have about 35,000 feet of planed and rough lumber to build improvements on their farms. They are going to put up a house and barn on Eddie's ranch. Billett says it is one of the best pieces of land in the Wood River valley. Then they will put up one more barn on his farm. That last spring they put up a barn on his farm covering 2,660 square feet. We are glad to know that they are so industrious. Both, Eddie and Billett, were carpenters while at Chemawa.
