This is the fourth race, the other three being won by Chemawa. In the race of 1907 the time was 5 hours 26 minutes, Chemawa leading Portland Y. M. C. A. by 12 minutes and 15 seconds. Second Annual relay was run in May of 1908, and was won by Chemawa in 5 hours, 16½ minutes, leading Portland Y. M. C. A. by 24 minutes and 18 seconds. Last year Chemawa won, the total time being 5 hours 31 minutes 43 seconds, leading Portland Y. M. C. A. by 9 minutes 43 seconds. In calculating the time this

year the .8 of a mile added to the course must be taken into consideration.

Tomorrow the entire school will have a holiday and will greet the first runner at the cross-roads east of the school and start the second relay with three cheers for Chemawa.
