OFFICERS' PARTY.

The battalion officers held their second annual party last night in the gymnasium. At about seven o'clock the guests began to arrive and by 8 the room room upon its floors about 120. The decorations were very beautiful. They consisted of red and white bunting running all around the gallery, pennants strung and hung from one side of the gallery to the other in four strings,

with one at every gallery hanger, and "Old Glory" hanging at the west end of it. But the feature of all was the rostrum decoration. It was made up of a table completely covered with a large flag, behind which was the battalion flag and the banner, also used by the battalion with the inscription, "Chemawa Indian School Cadets" crossed. At the ends of these were three muskets stacked to which the ends were fastened to make them seem to be waving. In the front of the table crossed were three swords, and in the center of the it was the faculty cup, which, for the past two years has been drilled for by the companies of the battalion at commencement, the company that wins it for three consecutive years to be the owner of it. In 1908 it was won by Company B and last year by Company A.

When the guests had all arrived and the band, consisting of ten pieces was ready, it was announced that there would be a grand march led by Major Smith.

After this was over the band played a few more pieces to make things more lively, until finally the guests were settled down at their places amusing themselves playing checkers' flinch, etc., until a late hour, when the refreshments, consisting of cocoa, sandwiches, ice cream, cake, lady fingers, pickles, bananas and oranges, were served. After these edibles were disposed of by the guests, the call sounded and it was announced that it was time to depart for quarters.
