PROPOSALS FOR COAL, WOOD, AND FISH, Indian school, Chemawa, Oregon, June 6, 1910.—SEALE! PROPOSALS, plainly marked on outside of envelope, "Proposals for coal, wood, and fish," and addressed to the undersigned at Chemawa, Oregon, will be received at the Indian school until 2 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, June 28, 1910, for furnishing and delivering as required during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, about 10 tons blacksmith coal, 2,000 cords wood and 20,000 pounds fish, as per specifications obtainable at the school. Bidders must state the price of each article to be offered under contract, and everything so offered shall be subject to rigid inspection. Right is reserved to reject any or all bids or any part of any bid if deemed for the best interest of the Service. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or draft on some United States depository or solvent National bank made payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for at least five percent of the amount of the proposal, which check or draft shall be forfeited to the United States in case a bidder receiving an award shall fail to execute promptly satisfactory contract in accordance with his bid, otherwise to be returned to the bidder.
