Gen. Nelson A. Miles says the aeroplanes are going to replace the ships of the navy in the coast defenses of this country, and not to be regarded as mere adjuncts to the floating ships of enormous expense. There is wonderful economy in that. Scores of flying machines can be built and sustained for the cost of one ship of war, and one of them with a live aviator will be able to patrol the coast for 100 miles or more and notify the land forces in a few minutes to such numbers that the country can be defended all the time from any possible attack. But General Miles says there will be no attack, because no foreign navy will be run into the teeth of the aeroplanes which may be sent out over them with bombs practically sure to sink them before they can approach within 100 miles of a coast, with the aviators flying so high that no gun can reach them with a destroying projectile. Now, then, sell the expensive ship for junk, and save millions for the people of this country who are tired of high

prices. The aeroplanes are all ready for the work. The statesman who makes delay on that point is not entitled to be heard for a minute when he talks about economy.—Worcester Telegram.
