RESERVATION INDIANS USE THE AUTOMOBILE.

It is not an unusual sight at Pendleton Oregon, and vicinity, to see a fullblooded Indian from the Umatilla Indian Reservation acting as chauffeur of an automobile and whizzing along the country road with his wife on the seat beside him.

In this rich farming region the automobile has displaced the farm horse with results, and the Indians on the Umatilla reservation near Pendleton have followed the white man's lead, with the result that it is now a common sight to see them flying about in gasoline cars. Some of the Indians on the reservation are very wealthy and farm on an extensive scale, many of them having purchased farms in the vicinity of the reservation itself, but even to carry butter, milk, grain and other produce into the town. With a true adaptability, the red men also utilize the auto for threshing, sawing wood, churning and even for pulling stumps. One of the Indians used his machine last spring to plow and harrow his truck garden. The variety of uses to which the automobile is put, when not used for transportation, is as extensive as those of the gasoline engine. A circular band takes the power from the motor to the circular saw, churner, thresher, cream separator or other apparatus it is desired to operate.—Ex.
