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### SELLING CATTLE.

A ruling that is important in deciding when an Indian can dispose of livestock purchased for him by the government was returned by Judge R. S. Bean in

the United States circuit court in Portland on Monday. Briefly the court held when the cattle has been purchased with money received from lands sold by Indians, the Indians have the right to dispose of their cattle as they see fit. A federal statute prohibits Indians from disposing of cattle and stock purchased for them by the government. The United States brought suit against O. T. Anderson to recover the value of cattle purchased from an Indian on the Klamath reservation. Anderson's defense was first, that he didn't know the cattle had been bought by the government when he purchased them and second, they had been purchased for the Indians with money secured from the sale of lands on the Klamath reservation, these lands being the property of the Indians, and hence the Indians should be allowed to dispose of them as they pleased.

Judge Bean held the first point of the defence was of no moment but sustained the second point.

United States Attorney McCourt will appeal the case to the supreme court of the United States, it being a question upon which that body has never made a ruling.
