The tuition fee for instruction is from \$100 to \$250, and there is no time limit, but about six weeks are necessary for a practical mechanic. The lecture rooms are large and are well filled by a class of young men anxious to learn how to fit themselves for a more responsible position. Chemawa occupies a similar field for the Indian boy, as he is given a like course, but without charge to the student.
