Enough telephone and telegraph poles, together with those used by all electric roads, electric lighting and power companies and all other concerns requiring poles to support their wires, to supply the yearly demand would make a forest of thousands of acres.

All these poles have been grown in this

and other countries during recent years and the immense demand has caused trees to be cut down by the millions all over the world.

More than \$7,000,000 was paid for poles in a year and still the demand increases.

All kinds of wood growing into tall trees have been tested, and all those found to possess lasting qualities are being used.

In regions where the timber is adapted for this use the small saplings and trees are being protected and new seeds planted, but with the increase in the demand and the slowness of growth there is an end not far away.

It is becoming a serious question and several concerns are experimenting with the hope that a pole can be manufactured that will take the place of those that nature has provided.—Ex.
