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### ORDER AND LAW.

Right laws are the truest safeguard of life, happiness and property, and the line most strongly emphasizing the difference between good and evil, barbarism and latter day christianity. Be a good citizen of your country and foster a sentiment within yourself for the laws of the land and by so doing you will insure yourself the enjoyment of those things which are dearest to the human heart. Love of fair play—a square deal—recognition of the rights of others as well as yourself; this is the kind of sentiment which makes good laws. ### WALL COLORS AND LIGHT.

In painting or papering the walls of a room the question often arises what color reflects the most and what the least light? Recent experiments in Germany gave the following results: Dark blue reflects 6 1 2 per cent of the light falling upon it; dark green, about 10 per cent; pale red, a little more than 10 per cent; dark yellow, 20 per cent; pale blue, 30 per cent; pale yellow, 40 per cent; pale green, 46 1-2 per cent; pale orange, nearly 55 per cent; pale white, 70 per cent. Glossiness and varnish increase the amount of light reflected.—Harper's Weekly.
