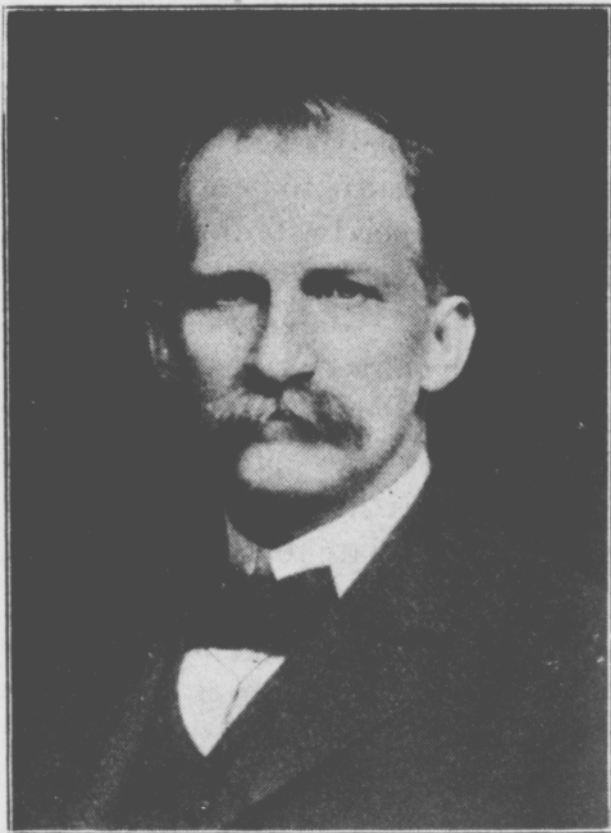


ham Lincoln, "the great emancipator" Names of many other illustrious men were cited whose memory history will forever keep green.
