

## Directs Mob At Own Lyching

Texas Cripple Pronounced by Lynchers Gamest Man They Ever Heard Of.

### "LET'S DO IT RIGHT"

His Last Words Were "No Use to Argue With a Mob, Buddy, They Hold Aces and I Hold Deuces"—Objects to Shooting.

Waco, Tex.—"Curly" Hackney, thirty-five, white, arrested for attacking an eight-year-old girl, was taken from jail here by a mob of 300 and hanged.

Hackney was crippled in the right leg from a recent gunshot wound. He was strictly unshaken. His last words were: "No use to argue with a mob, buddy; they hold aces and I hold deuces. I'll say only one thing—they're making it out worse than it really was."

Hackney arrived at the scene of the hanging in the first car, which was followed by 70 others. Hackney coolly leaned against the side of the car and smoked a cigarette. A shout was put up immediately for a rope.

A voice cried: "Hang him with some kid chains!"

"Aw, get a rope," replied Hackney. "Do it up right."

The sound was then heard of some one tearing up a heavy cloth, preparing a crude rope. Hackney, hearing it, said:

"Well, boys, there is one consolation, anyway, I'll get to shake hands with several of you in hell. I did it and I guess I'll pay."

The rope was placed about his neck. He was asked if he wished to make a statement.

Objects to Shooting.

"I would like one thing fellows. If there is a six-shooter in the crowd please don't use it on my body. Here, tie my hands behind me so that I won't fight the rope. May God bless you all."

He was then led limping along behind several of the leaders to a tree. While the rope was being drawn up, Hackney said:

"Here, boys, let's do the thing right; put the jolly old noose under my left jaw."

This was done, and one of the hangers remarked to him:

"You certainly are the gamest crippled man I ever heard of."

"Sure I am," replied Hackney. "There never was a gamer sicker than I. I'm not afraid to die. I've faced it before too many times."

He was then placed on a high gate and with several men pulling on the



"Let's Do the Thing Right." rope he was swung off his feet. As the crowd turned to leave, some one fired a shot at the body hanging in the moonlight and instantly a fireball was fired. The body was killed.

A letter received at this office from Wm. Lee McCaleb of Heppner, states that himself as well as the rest of the family were all down with the flu some time ago and that it was necessary to call in help to wait upon them.

He states: "We have just finished up the long winter I ever saw. We had full three months of constant frozen ground and snow most of the time. Last year the hay growers of this section complained they were not able to get rid of the hay. This year the stockmen complain that they are not able to get hay to tide through on. Fine spring opened everyone is busy and spring work is being crowded so rapidly as possible and a good showing has been made."

The snow went off with a rush playing havoc with the roads in general, but we have most of them back in passable condition now and are starting on new construction. We have four new roads under construction besides the finishing up of the Oregon Washington highway as far as Heppner, which connects with the Columbia highway at Heppner Junction.

We put in a little over \$200,000 in road work in our county last year but we will not have that much to put in this year, though the heaviest of the work is done, or nearly so, and we believe in a short time we will have our roads under control."

He was born at West Stayton and is survived by his father and six brothers. Funeral services took place at Stayton on Sunday which were attended by a number from Turner.

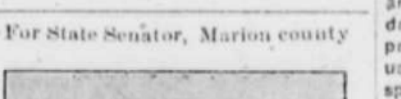

## POSTAL IMPROVEMENT WEEK IS OBSERVED

May 1 Sees Inauguration of First General Campaign of Kind in Service.

Without the Postal Service, business would languish in a day, and be at a standstill in a week. Public opinion would die of dry rot. National hatred or prejudice only would flourish, and narrow-mindedness thrive.

It is the biggest distinctive business in the world and it comes nearer to the innermost interests of a greater number of men and women than any other institution on earth. No private business, however widespread, touches so many lives, so often or so sharply; no church reaches into so many souls, butters so many pulses, has so many human beings dependent on its ministrations.

"Postal Improvement Week" has been set for May 1, by the Postmaster General. This is the first general campaign of its kind in the Postal Service for several decades. Public opinion and their organizations, large users of the mail, newspapers, motion pictures, advertisers, and the entire organization of 325,000 postal workers are to be enlisted in this country-wide campaign of interest in postal improvements.

Your help is vital. Address your letters plainly with pen or typewriter. Give street address. Spell out name of State, don't abbreviate. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner of envelopes (not on the back) and always look at your letter before dropping in the mail to see if it is properly addressed. This care in the use of the mails is for your benefit and speeds up the dispatch and delivery of mail matter.

If you have any complaints of poor service make them to your postmaster. He has instructions to investigate them and report to the department.
