Willard Bear attended the county spelling match in Salem, Saturday. He also took in some of the May Day program at Willamette University and the circus parade.

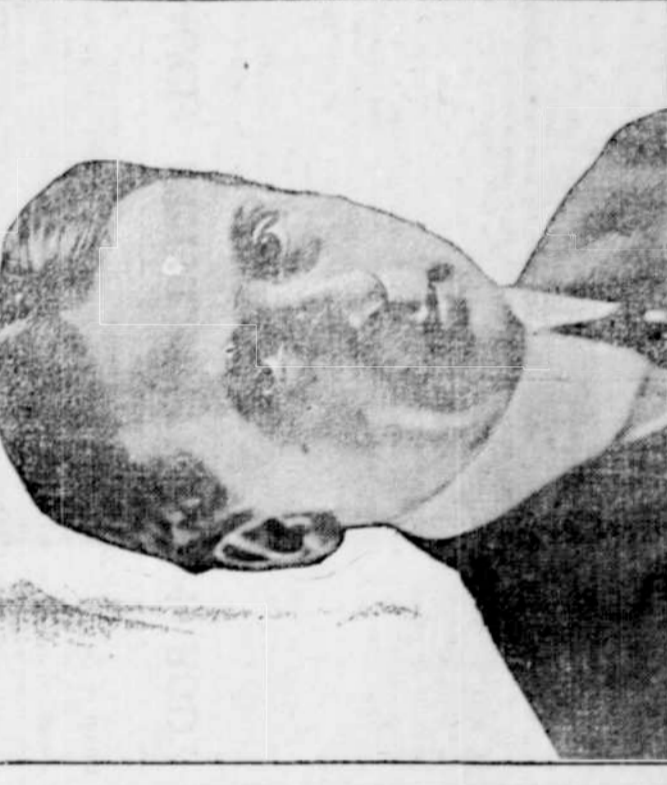
