

Oregon Jersey Bull Qualifies For A. J. C. C. Silver Medal

Tiddledywin's Noble 10087 has been awarded one of the American Jersey Cattle Club's silver medals on the exceptionally high production of his daughters in heifer form. This bull has had but eight daughters finish tests to date, however, he has transmitted his productive characteristics to his progeny as shown by the records of his tested daughters.

He is a member of the "Noble" family, being a son of the famous Noble of Oakland 95790, which animal has forty-two daughters with Register of Merit records and forty-eight sons in the Register of Merit, including such well known sires as: Imported Golden Fern's Noble 145762, Noble Sensational Lad 118336 and Fontaine's Chieftain. In fact the half-brothers of Tiddledywin's Noble that have

been given a chance, by the owners testing their daughters, have all made good.

To get back to the records of the daughters of Tiddledywin. His eight daughters have averaged 8410 pounds of milk, 489 pounds of butter fat, at an average age of three years and four months.

Two of his daughters on test now will finish their second official records very shortly, one as a senior four year old, Tiddledywin's Noble Pride with about 12,500 pounds of milk and 725 pounds of butter-fat. The other, Lady Tiddledywin, finishes June 29, and will go over 700 pounds of butter-fat.

Tiddledywin's Noble was awarded a silver medal on the records of the three following daughters:
