ANCIENT FORESTS OF AMERICA
 Continuous Growth of Conifers Once
 Known to Have Covered the
 Whole Northern Continent.

Long ago, in the early Cretaceous
 period, according to Prof. J. E. Kirk-
 wood of the University of Montana, a
 continuous forest of conifers and cy-
 cads covered the North American con-
 tinent. In the late Cretaceous the land
 became divided by an arm of the sea
 which extended north from the Gulf
 to the Arctic, through what is now
 Texas and Montana. During this
 period was the beginning of the
 marked differentiation of the eastern
 flora from that of the West. In the
 East are the elm, hickory, chestnut,
 persimmon, sassafras, tulip, Osage or
 orange, and magnolia, which are not
 found on the Pacific coast; in the West
 are the Sequoias, cypress, and giant
 cactus, which do not occur East of the
 Rocky mountains. Oaks are on both
 coasts, but not the same species of
 oaks; the same to a large extent in
 true of maples, alders, pines, firs, and

many others. Toward the close of the
 Cretaceous there entered many hard-
 wood types of modern form.

To Test a Diamond.
 A variety of tests may be advisable
 for one who is not an expert judge of
 diamonds, says the Scientific Ameri-
 can. The old test of cutting a piece
 of glass with the stone under investi-
 gation is now reversed, though with
 an additional variation. A file takes
 the place of glass, and the rasping
 edge of the little tool is brought
 against the sparkling surface of the
 gem under suspicion. This is an at-
 tack no impostor can survive for a
 single instant. No impression, of
 course, can be made on a genuine dia-
 mond. Another test even more severe
 consists of the following procedure:
 The stone is covered with borax, heat-
 ed and then dropped into a receptacle
 containing cold water. Glass or simi-
 lar imitations will be shattered, but
 a diamond comes through the ordeal
 unharmed.

Mother's Cook Book

GOOD THINGS FOR THE FAMILY
 EVERYBODY in the household likes cinnamon rolls or cinnamon buns. The following is a reliable recipe:

Take one cupful each of milk, water and sugar, two eggs, three-fourths of a cupful of shortening, one yeast cake and a teaspoonful of salt. Scald the milk and while it is still hot pour it over the shortening and add the sugar and hot water; when cool add the yeast cake which has been softened in one-half cupful of water, add the salt and enough flour to make a batter which drops from the spoon. Beat it thoroughly and let stand in a warm place over night. In the morning add the well beaten eggs and flour to make a dough which can be kneaded; knead lightly and well, put back into a well buttered bowl and let rise until double its bulk. Separate into two parts and roll out into a sheet. Spread this with soft butter, brown sugar, cinnamon and well washed and dried currants. Roll in a long roll and cut the buns in inch slices. Place them

in a pan and set in a warm place to become light. Bake in a moderate oven with a grate under them if there is danger of burning.

If the family likes sticky buns put one tablespoonful of butter, one-half cupful of brown sugar, one-half cupful of sirup, and one-half cupful of water in a sauce pan and boil until thick. Add currants to it. When the buns are baked turn them upside down and spread this mixture evenly over the sides and bottom of the buns.

Pimento Cheese Rolls.
 Roll out a raised dough like the above cinnamon bun mixture, spread with a layer of softened butter, then with pimento cheese. Roll up and cut in slices one inch thick, place cut sides up in a greased pan, let rise until light and bake in a moderate oven.

A good finish for a plain raisin cake is to spread it while hot very generously with butter, then sprinkle with a mixture of cinnamon and powdered sugar, using a teaspoonful of cinnamon to one-half cupful of sugar—more if desired.
