REDS SHOOT TAX EVADERS

Inflict Death Penalty on Peasants Who Dodge Grain Levy in Russia.

Rostoff-on-Don, Russia.—The death penalty is being inflicted in the Kuban and Don districts upon peasants who attempt to evade the grain tax which the government has instituted instead of money taxes. At Krasnodark, a peasant, and two officials whom he bribed to assist him in dodging the grain levy were all shot, and radical steps are being taken throughout south Russia to check the banditry which the Moscow government denounces as nothing more than an effort to escape taxation.

MOTHER CUTS OFF HEAD OF CHILD

Drowns Another in Rain Barrel and Third Is Rescued, Almost Dead, by Father.

Russell Springs, Ky.—After severing the head of her twelve-year-old daughter with a butcher knife and hurling her six-year-old son and an infant into a barrel filled with rain water, Mrs. Arnold Holt, residing at the home of her father, George Harris, ran head-on against the sharp edge of a hatchet which she had wedged in a fence and injured herself probably fatally.

Mrs. Holt is believed to have become suddenly insane as a result of brooding over a divorce suit. She was separated from her husband several months ago.

Awakened by the screams of the daughter, George Harris rushed to the door in time to see Mrs. Holt sever the girl's head with one blow of a sharp butcher knife. The son and the infant, who were nearby, then were seized by the demented mother and

plunged into the barrel of water, the cover thrown on top of them to prevent their escape.

Tearing her hair and shrieking, Mrs. Holt then ran to a fence in which she previously had fastened a hatchet. Backing away 20 feet, she lowered her head and ran straight against the sharp blade, cleaving her skull.

The father watched the tragedy as though paralyzed until the woman fell, then ran to notify neighbors. The boy was found hanging head down over the edge of the rain barrel in an unconscious condition and hope is held for his recovery. The infant perished in the barrel.

Mrs. Holt was unconscious when picked up by neighbors and physicians who attended her said she would not recover. During a brief lapse of consciousness she whispered: "Why didn't God let me finish it?"

She is said to have been despondent since her separation from her husband and dreaded the ordeal of appearing in court in the divorce proceedings which she had instituted.

Arnold Holt, the husband, formerly was employed as a salesman at Louisville. His present whereabouts is not known.

Mrs. Arnold's brother, Elan Harris, is a well-known dentist of Danville, Ky.

THIS CAVEWOMAN TOO ROUGH

Ice-man Barks at Marriage After Kansas City Woman Hops Up Wagon With Him.

Kansas City, Mo.—Martin Connolly is a small ice-man and Elsie Rogers is a large housemaid. A policeman found Elsie hopping up the ice wagon with Martin. Next both were in the South side municipal court.

"She is all the time following me on my ice route," said Connolly. "She wants me to marry her, but I don't love her. She threatened to kill me if I didn't get a marriage license."

Elsie admitted it and asked Martin to change his mind. "You're too rough," he answered. Judge Fleming fined both \$25.

Cuts Off Wife's Hair to Keep Her at Home

Akron, O.—Nearly four feet of golden tresses was shorn from the head of Mrs. Clara Cox, twenty-seven, by her husband, Orrin Cox, a rubber worker, to prevent her from leaving her family to travel as a hair tonic demonstrator. It was learned here.

They quarreled over the proposed tour, and she stayed away from home until late the other night. Cox awaited her return. He watched her as she braided her hair for the night. Then as she stood in front of her mirror he clipped the braids, which reached to her ankles.

"I would give a million dollars if I could restore your hair," Cox told her as they were reconciled at the hospital where the wife is suffering from a nervous collapse.

Struck by Lightning in Chair. Fort Wayne, Ind.—While sitting in a chair at his rooming house one afternoon Orville Callaway, age twenty-three, was struck by lightning. Ruth Hutson, a sister-in-law, was sitting on the arm of Callaway's chair and, although shocked, was not hurt seriously. Callaway was taken to a hospital. He will recover.

Tombstone at Parents' Grave Seized for Debt

New York.—A tombstone on a plot in a cemetery can be seized and sold at auction to satisfy a debt for an unpaid balance on the stone. It was decided by Justice MacCrata in Queens Supreme court.

The makers of the monument, which was ordered by Joseph Brandl, said that their attorney is arranging to auction the stone.

The firm contracted with Brandl August 20, 1920, to put up a monument and four name posts on his lot in Calvary cemetery for \$1,250. Brandl paid \$575 and had the bodies of his father, mother and two sisters buried in the plot. Other installments were not met, and after trying vainly to find Brandl, the company brought suit.

BLACK HAND FORBIDS BOY VICTIM'S TOMB

Threaten to Kill Father of Giuseppe Varotta, Who Squealed on the Gang.

New York.—The fear of the Black Hand has never yet been lifted from the heart of Salvatore Varotta, although it has been almost a year since his five-year-old son, Giuseppe, was kidnaped and his body thrown into the Hudson river.

Frequently agents of the Black Hand come to the corner where Varotta struggles to make a living by selling vegetables and fruits from a pushcart, and tell him that the Black

Hand still remembers that it was on his testimony that five men were arrested for the crime, and that one of them is now in the death-house at Sing Sing awaiting execution.

Varotta saved every penny possible for many months, enough to make a deposit on a monument for the grave of his son. This will bear a portrait of the boy and this inscription:

"Here lies the remains of Giuseppe Varotta, a five-year-old boy killed by the Black Hand. He was kidnaped by the Black Hand on May 24, 1921, and his body was found in the Hudson river, off Piermont, on June 11, 1921. Erected by his father."

"Nobody but me and my wife knew of the monument, we thought," said Varotta, "but the Black Hand found it out. A man came to my pushcart and said: 'You mustn't do that, Varotta. You'll get hurt, Varotta; you'll get killed.'"

"Then the man ran away before I could call the policeman, who stands near my pushcart all day."

AVIATOR ATTACKED BY EAGLE

King of Birds Breaks Neck Against Airplane Strut in Battle in Air.

Quantico, Va.—A combat in the air between an eagle and a marine corps plane, in which the king of the air lost his life, took place near Quantico.

Lieut. R. O. Sanderson, flying near the flying field, saw a flock of birds and gave chase. An eagle which had been hovering high over the flock wheeled on his approach and at top speed flew directly toward him.

The bird struck one of the wire braces of the plane with such force as to break the brace and the eagle's neck. The bird then was caught in the braces of the plane. The eagle measured seven feet between the wing tips.

Republicans Elect State Chairman

The smooth political work of Walter L. Toose, Sr., of Salem, was shown in the election of his son, Walter Toose, Jr., of McMinnville, as chairman of the republican state committee at Portland last Saturday. Long before the different county central committee meetings over the state were called, Papa Toose was laying the foundation for his son's election as state chairman.

How well the game was played was proven by the election at Portland when his son received 30 votes to A. H. Lea's 6 votes. In view of the fact that Mr. Lea is recognized as quite a republican politician in the state and a big gun among the higher-ups in Portland, makes Mr. Toose's selection a great victory over the dictates of a few who try to dominate and manage state politics out of Portland. Papa Toose has a secret method of drawing to him men of political importance and weight whose views and schemes are valuable in committee fights and when the time arrived for the election of a chairman, all that Papa had to do was to wink his eye and grunt—the tip being given, results followed.

At the Saturday morning session of the committee meeting, Claud Ingalls, editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times, was called upon for a speech. He remarked as follows:

"The emblem of the Republican party in Oregon should not be the roary and the cross; it should not be the white gown and the hooded cap." A gasp went over the crowd that jammed into the room at the Imperial hotel where the meeting was held.

"I am perfectly neutral," the editor continued, when he could. "In my house we use Goblin soap and K. C. baking powder. I want to say right here that the emblem of the Republicans in this state should be the Grand Old Party elephant; the emblem of Garfield, McKinley, Roosevelt, Taft and Harding." This remark caused the ceiling to crack. There was real applause.

There must be an interesting inside story as to why Oregon was selected at this time for the attempt of the Fraternity of the Masonic lodge to initiate a compulsory school attendance law. It is impossible to believe that the movement had its entire inception and authorization locally. If not, has Oregon's reputation as a good field for political experimentation and its receptiveness and responsiveness to new tendencies been responsible for its selection? Or is the movement to be explained by the fact that Oregon is reported to have become a thoroughly federalized state along religious lines?—Oregon Voter.

The body was found about five o'clock in the evening by the parents lodged in a d.i.f. Funeral services and burial were held at Aumsville Tuesday.
