Church Growth

A very interesting article was published in the Oregonian of Saturday, March 31, giving the religious gains of America. The total members added to the churches are given as 1,229,428, which was 50 per cent greater than the average annual growth for the preceding five years.

During the year there was a gain of 9391 congregations and 15,252 ministers. A total of 214,583 ministers man the 243,550 congregations of the country.

The Catholic church shows a membership of 18,104,804. Its figures represent estimated church population and include all baptized persons. Evangelical protestant churches show a membership of 27,454,080 which indicates communicants only.

The following figures give the number of constituencies of the great bodies.
Protestant, 78,118,481; Roman Catholic, 18,104,804; Jews, 1,600,000; Latter Day Saints (Mormons), 604,082; Eastern Orthodox (Greek and Russian), 486,054.

Church Growth

The Methodist are first in gains in the Protestant churches, with 122,975; Baptist next with 171,780. The Methodists have the largest constituency, there figures being 23,253,854; Baptists, 22,869,058.

Raise Insured Valuation of Mail

(From our Washington Bureau)
Washington.—After April 1st the insurance limitation payable for lost registered mail will be increased from \$50 to \$100, according to a statement issued by Postmaster General Harry S. New. The change was made in response to a widespread demand from the public which is increasing its patronage of the mail service for shipment of packages of considerable value.
