We quote from the official organ of the Dairymen's League: "A farmer of the famous Aroclon potato-growing section of Maine, has 160 acres devoted to potatoes, seven and one-half miles from market, producing 24,000 barrels of potatoes a year, and found it impossible to deliver the potatoes in season.

"On account of the road grade between farm and railroad, one team of horses could only haul 20 barrels of potatoes at a trip. It would have taken 1,200 working days with one team—just a little more than three years—to haul the potato crop to market. It would take 20 teams and twenty drivers to do the work in season, which would cost more than \$6,000.

"A motor truck was put to work, and based on the old price of 25 cents for hauling the potatoes by horses, this truck paid for itself the first season, hauling 24,000 barrels."

This is not an advertisement of the motor truck. Any motor truck would do it, provided it had the road and no motor truck could do it unless it had a good road over which to travel.

This is not an advertisement of potato farming. The same economy may be had with any produce, whether lettuce or grain, hay or onions, alfalfa or corn, if there is a good road over which to haul it. No crop, no matter how profitable to raise, is as profitable to sell, if it has to be marketed over a poor road.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. —Ford cars are today at a new low price level through an announcement effective October 2, made by Edsel B. Ford, President of the Ford Motor Company, Detroit.

This reduction in the prices of Ford cars and trucks is in line with the well-established policy of the company. It is notable also that this decrease follows the introduction of many changes and improvements throughout the Ford lines.

The new list prices on Ford cars f.o.b. Detroit are as follows:  
Runabout, \$269 to \$265; with starter and demountable rims, \$350; touring car, \$298 to \$295; with starter and demountable rims, \$380; coupe, \$530 to \$525; four door sedan, \$725 to \$685; Ford chassis, \$235 to \$230; one ton truck chassis, \$380 to \$370.

The new prices apply to the Ford weekly purchase plan. Persons enrolled under the plan and who have not yet taken delivery of their cars automatically benefit by the reduction in prices.

The last price reduction by the Ford Motor company was made about one year ago, October 17th last, bringing the prices of Ford cars at that time to the lowest level in the history of the company.

The big reduction in the price of the four door sedan brings it within reach of a large field of buyers. This type sedan was introduced in the Ford line a little over a year ago and because of its low, graceful lines, its roominess and its attractive fittings, it at once came into high favor as an enclosed car for family use.

The price of the Fordson tractor is increased from \$395 to \$420 f.o.b. Detroit.

No change is made in the price of Lincoln cars and nose is contemplated, a company announcement says, stating that the Lincoln prices are considered fair in view of the number of improvements which have been made in the cars.

The theme of the conference is "The Older Boy and His World." One of the outstanding features this year is the arrangement of which every boy will have a personal interview with an able man regarding his future work or the other matters in which he is interested. This will help average of 60 delegates to these conferences the past 3 years. Edwin Socolofsky, County Y.M.C.A. secretary, says he expects a record attendance at the Portland conference Nov. 30 to Dec. 2.

**OREGON BATH-HOUSE OPENS UNDER NEW NAME**

Editor of the Tribune:  
I noticed in one of the Portland papers that the new warden of the state prison was troubled by the fact, that the prisoners had nothing to do. He is not the only one that complains about it. The taxpayers that put up the money to support the state institutions are getting tired of the expense of feeding a lot of convicts on the "fat of the land," the majority of them doing nothing to pay for their board, while other states receive a handsome profit from the same source. I have in mind while writing this, the state prison of the state of Minnesota, and a few points regarding the management of it, that I learned during my residence of forty years in that state. The first I remember was the last and shoe factory, installed by a St. Paul firm, then came a plant making wooden buckets, that was where "Cole Younger" worked painting buckets, afterwards he painted the "Minnesota Chief" thrashing machines when the harvest works were installed. But the greatest thing for the benefit of the farmer was the binding twine factory that makes a first class twine and sells it to the farmer at a moderate price, if they order in advance. It is never sold in the open market. These plants are still running and others have been installed. The prisoners are educated, industrious, and peaceable, and escapes or attempted escapes are almost unknown. The State prison at Stillwater Minn. has made the state of Minn. a profit of half million dollars in one year. That goes a long way in the reduction of taxes. Sometimes there is no state tax. To my certain knowledge no state tax was levied in 1910. The profit from the state prison and royalties from mineral land paid all expenses. Will someone please compare this with the reports of our state prison and tell me the answer.

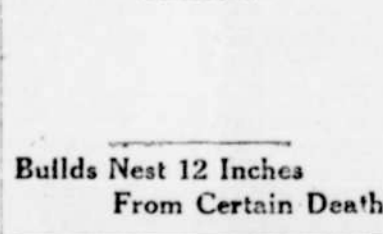

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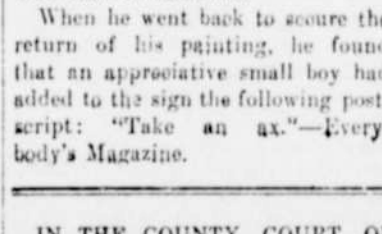
