Washington, D. C., March 26, 1924.
Congressman Hawley has been advised that further allotments of funds for the construction of the new highway from the Cox and Douglas County line to Harney has been approved by the Federal Highway Administration.

The Engineers of the War Department have approved the improvement of the Snake River at an expense of \$25,000. This work includes the removal of the north slough below below Oshman.

The Bureau of Lighthouses, Department of Commerce, states that in the preparation of the next estimates to be submitted to the Budget Commission, they are considering an appropriation for improvements in the lights and other marks on the Columbia River

between Portland and the sea. The Bureau says, "The Lighthouse Service considers that such improvements are desirable and justified by the traffic on this river, but funds are not available to permit taking up this work at the present time."

Two cents a day, in American money, will save one starving German baby in that war-torn country, according to a statistic worked out by the American committee for relief of German children, which is now gathering a fund of \$10,000,000 for this purpose throughout the United States, with Major-General Henry T. Allen, former commander of American troops on the Rhine, as national chairman, President Coolidge, Herbert Hoover and others of their type have endorsed the campaign.

SURPLUS WAR MATERIAL
NOW BUILDING ROADS

The Congressional enactment that surplus war material, useful in the construction of roads, be given to the several states for that purpose, has worked out to such good effect that more than 4,000,000,000 worth of trucks, shovels, graders, digging machinery, concrete mixers, and other instruments useful in road construction, are now actively at work in the several states carrying out the policy of Congress to further road building by the resources of the Nation as well as those of the states.

Proponents of the idea that the present Federal Aid plan, by which the government gives money to the states to match their appropriations for road building, is but the forerunner of the day when the National government will build, own, control and forever maintain a back bone system of national highways, find in this cooperation of the national government but another reason for the nation to take over the building of from 100,000 to 200,000 main north and south and east and west highways.

It is contended by friends of this idea in Congress that if the nation can give valuable property to the states to build roads, and give national money to the states to help them build roads, there is neither moral, legal, economic or political reason why the Nation cannot give the whole cost of a main trunk line system to the states, thus nationally bonding the states together in a closer brotherhood for the better unity and preservation of the whole body politic.

Farm Pointers
O. A. C. Exp. Station.

It is a good idea to put clean sand on the floor of the brooder house underneath the litter. It should be placed in the house several days before the chicks are put in so that it will be thoroughly dried out.

The first week in the brooder house is the critical one. Watch the chicks carefully during this period. Most of the trouble is caused by overcooling—pinning in the corners, and by chilling.

Letting nervous in Oregon will probably be smaller this year than last. At least there will be no outstanding increase as has been the case the past few years. Many sections are reporting smaller plantings than last year because prices then did not come up to expectations.

A deformed foot or crooked leg of a horse is often the result of neglect in stimulating the colt's feet.

Be sure to feed GOOD buttermilk or your skim milk. Many chicks are ruined each year by feeding milk in which there is washing soda or some other form of neutralizer.

Watch the litter at this time of the year and change as often as it becomes damp and heavy. In some localities it is best to change it every 10 days. Damp litter causes the house to be damp, and is the source of much disease.
