

TO INSURE CROP OF VIGOROUS LAMBS

Breeding ewes which are in good condition in the fall need little or no grain in winter until about a month before lambing, if given all the bright legume hay they will eat with an al lowance of silage or roots in addition writes Dorsey McAtee in the Prairie Farmer. At this time or earlier, if they are not in thrifty, vigorous condition, they should be given a limited amount of concentrates up to one-half pound per head with roughage.

The best roughages for ewes are the legume hays-clover and alfalfawhich they like and are rich in protein, and help ward off constipation, a serious danger of the ewe. Other roughages useful to feed with legume hay are bright corn fodder and oat straw which has some hay in it. Timothy hay is too constipating for ewes.
