In an interview with P. E. Thomason, Monday, on his return from Portland, we learned that the linen mill that has been fostered by Robert Simpson, of Clifton, New Jersey, and Sidney Starling, of North Tonawanda, New York, will be located at Vancouver, Wash. They have secured the buildings of the Standifer Steel ship yards on long lease and expect to have the mill in operation some time in June. As soon as the management decided on Vancouver as the location of the mill \$100,000 was raised by that city. The main building, Mr. Thomason stated, was 96x450 feet three stories high and all clear floor space. The other building is 200x450 feet. There are five railroad tracks into the plant. Their plans call for eight scutching plants to be erected in the flax district and the probabilities are that Turner will get at least one of these. These plants will mean a lot for this section as the retting and scutching represent the big end of the flax game.

**FATHER AND SON BANQUET TO BE HELD SOON**

If plans that are in prospect can be carried out Turner will be treated to a Father and son banquet sponsored by Turner Troop Boy Scouts of America. The boys will be assisted in the venture by Benj.
