GRANGE DEPARTMENT

Test your seeds by placing them between blotters kept in a warm place and cover with water, or plant a certain amount in rows in a small box and keep moist and in a warm place.

Examine your bee hives at least once every two weeks to keep the moths destroyed. Ants and mice are other pests to fight. Pist sweet clover or alfalfa to supply the bee with food for honey. Place hives in orchard or other places where flowers or blossoms grow.

Dip poultry to exterminate lice. Dust the hen with Sodium Fluorid which will destroy completely all lice present. It should be kept in closely covered cans.

The farmer destroys larkspur to prevent the poisoning of his cows. The city nurseryman sells it to set out in the home garden. The French pink is another pest. It is also cultivated in the gardens under the name of bachelor buttons and the seed sells for ten cents a teaspoon full. There are a large number of other plants in the same category.

Through the courtesy of the Turner Flax and Fibre Company we have on our desk a copy of the "Het Vlas" a paper published in Belgium, which contains some interesting articles on the handling of flax which we will reprint for the benefit of our readers. Another article will appear in an early issue of the Tribune.

BEST FIBRES AS SUBSTITUTES FOR COTTON

The outstanding characteristic of best fibres in their occurrence in much larger unit fibres than cotton. In cotton the unit is the individual fibre seed. Aside from the breaking up of some fibres, and minor changes due to stretching or shrinking, the cotton fibre stays of the same length from boll to finished cloth, and of the same diameter.

The best fibres are entirely different from this. Taking flax, which is typical, the plant grows at its best to a height of thirty or forty inches. Just under the thin outer skin or "bark" there is a layer of fibres covering the stem and branches from root to seed bolls. In the plant the layer is one solid group of fibres, all fastened together by the "gum" which is a natural adhesive and medium of protection.

Linen manufacturing really starts with the harvesting of these plants, for since they are all growing in the same direction, straight up and down, nature has already furnished one of the conditions so desirable in yarn manufacture, parallelism of fibres. The plants are therefore harvested and kept in bunches all through the preparatory processes. First we have bunches of plants, but after the operations that remove the woody parts of the stems and roots and seed bolls, we have bunches of fibres. They are more correctly, bunches of fibre bundles, for as the flax stems are processed, the layer of enveloping fibres split up into narrow ribbons of fibres perhaps as much as two feet or more in length. After the removal of the stems, the fibre bundles are too coarse for fine linen and somewhat tangled, so the next processes are designed to comb them out straight and to split the fibre groups into finer and finer units, until they are ready to lay in handuffs in a parallel and overlapping arrangement on the spread board to proceed on their way to roving and yarn.

The result is that the fibres entering the real manufacturing process are 12, 18 or even 24 inches long. Again compare with cotton, usually but little over one inch.

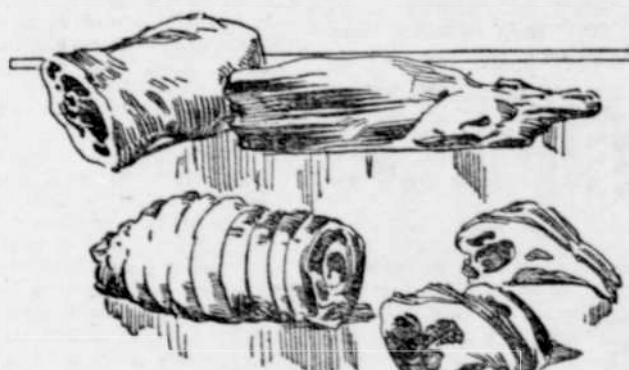
