Mr. and Mrs. Bidgood are giving a Hallowe'en Masquerade party for the students of the High School, Saturday Oct 31.

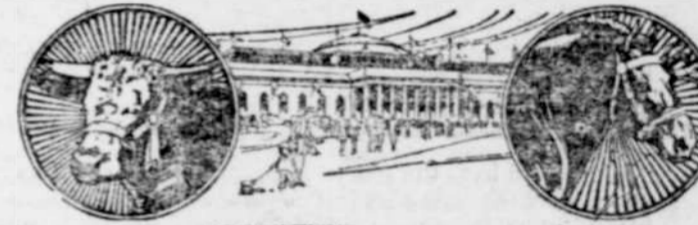
Friday night a basketball game will be played between the Turner Town Team and the Turner High School team. Let's all come and root for the Turner high.
