

Worthy of High Honor

Sir Joshua Reynolds was the first president of the Royal academy, London. He was chosen in 1768. Joshua, probably the best portrait painter of England, was a friend of Dr. Samuel Johnson, the literary dietator of his time, and of the poet, Offver Goldsmith,
