TO THE VOTERS OF THE CITY OF TURNER

We, your council, have called an election for the 12th of January, 1926, for the purpose of permitting the electors to approve or reject certain amendments to the city charter. The reason for the amendments is that certain sections in the city charter are ineffectual and if the city forced suit the outcome would be in doubt. This is corrected. Many sections are repealed which are out of date.

The council also asks that the charter tax rate of 5 mills be raised to 7 1/2 mills. When the former tax rate was made 50c went further than \$1.00 does today. The yearly light bill and hydrant rent use up all the general fund and there is no money for other purposes. A sinking fund also has to be provided for to pay off the water bonds.
