NOTICE DOG OWNERS

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by the County Court of Marion County: To comply with the present law, all dogs of Marion County must be licensed. The law reads:

"Every person owning or keeping any dog over the age of eight months within the State of Oregon shall, not later than March 1 of each year or within thirty days after he becomes the owner or keeper of such dog, procure from the County Clerk of the County in which said person resides a license for such a dog." The license to March 1st, is \$1.00 on all Male and Spayed Females, and \$2.00 on all Females. On and after March 1st of each year a PENALTY of \$1.00 will attach on all Males and Spayed Females, and \$2.00 on all Females not licensed.—Making licenses ON AND AFTER MARCH 1st, \$2.00 on all Males and Spayed Females, and \$4.00 on all Females. It is a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine with costs, not to procure a dog license, if you are the owner or keeper of a dog. Application blanks for Licenses are in all Postoffices or Banks outside of Salem. The County Court expects all sheep or goats for which Bounty is claimed, to be listed on the Tax Rolls of the County.
