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ARISTOCRAT AND COMMONER

This month we celebrate the birthdays of two of our greatest presidents. Abraham Lincoln on Feb. 12 and George Washington on Feb. 22. There have been no two men great in national life with a greater contrast between them than these two. George Washington, an aristocrat of the highest order, a descendent of the English aristocracy. Lincoln born in the most humble surroundings in a small windowless log cabin in the frontier section of Illinois. Washington had all the advantages of education that money could procure. Lincoln acquired his education from borrowed books and from books bought with money earned splitting rails. He worked his way up step by step until he became the Civil War president of the United States. George Washington served as a colonel in the Colonial troops in the service of England. When the revolution came Colonel Washington went over to the side of the colonies, was given command of the first United States Troops, and at the close of the war was acclaimed "The Father of his Country." Lincoln, whose sole aim was the abolition of slavery and the re-uniting of the nation, was successful and was acclaimed as the "Saviour of His Country." It seemed an act of providence that such men as these should be raised to the leadership of the country during two of its most critical periods.

CONSERVATION BREAKS RUBBER PRICES

According to a statement by the head of the Firestone Rubber Company, the price of automobile tires is on the decline. He gives as his reason the conservation of rubber. The motorist in place of throwing away the time every time he has a blowout is resorting to repairs, thereby getting from three to five months more wear out of the old tires. This practice has lessened the sale of tires to such an extent that the drop in price was the inevitable result. No matter what the cause we are all glad to see the decline in price. Firestone also states that in place of working a hardship on the manufacturers it has rebounded onto the heads of the British rubber monopoly. Wherever it has rebounded we hope it stays there, and the price of tires continues to drop.

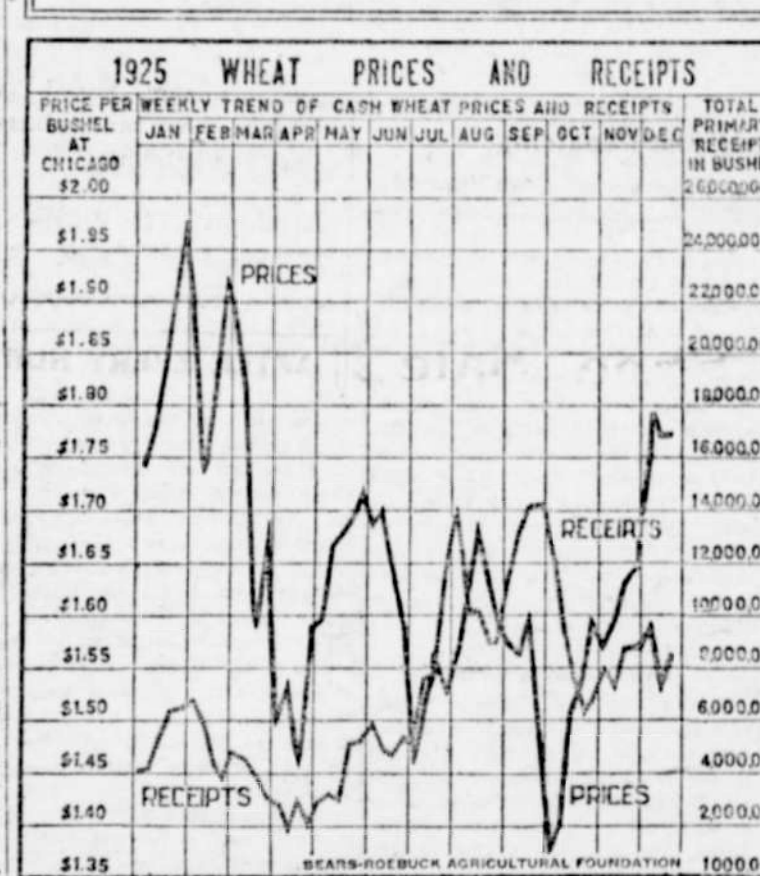

Wheat Crop of 1925 Shows Lowest Average Since 1904



The 1925 wheat market has been one of many surprises for the growers of both winter and spring wheat, states the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. Owing to unfavorable weather conditions last winter, which caused a large abandonment of winter wheat acreage due to the winter killing of nearly ten million acres, or 23 1/2 per cent of the area sown in wheat, the total crop production in 1925 reached only 69,365,000 bushels as compared to 82,627,000 bushels the year before. With the exception of 1917, this is the heaviest abandonment of wheat area on record. The final harvest averaged only 12.5 bushels per acre, which is the lowest average since 1904—spring wheat, which looked very promising at first, also lost heavily through injury from rust. The yield per acre was cut down to 12.9 bushels, which is 3.3 bushels below the 1924 average.

The carry-over of wheat from 1924 was moderate. From 635,000,000 to 650,000,000 bushels are required for domestic consumption. Exports up to the end of December were nearly 900,000,000 bushels, and the remaining exportable surplus is small. Both winter and spring combined production totaled 103,262,000 bushels less than in 1924, making it the smallest wheat crop since 1917 in terms of production and in proportion to population, the smallest wheat crop since 1890.

Because of a belief in a world shortage, wheat prices early in 1925 reached a high level, going up to \$1.95. When it became evident that the apparent world shortage had been exaggerated, the market declined rapidly and went as low as \$1.45 in April.
