### RALPH ISAACSON WRITES OF MISSION WORK

A few days ago we received a letter from Brother Ralph Isaacson who is connected with the Yotsuya mission at Tokyo, Japan. We were to use it as the basis of a story. After reading the letter we decided to let him tell it himself. Here it is.

1766 Nakano, Tokyo, Japan. Jan. 14, 1928.

Mr. F. P. Rowley, editor of Turner Tribune, Turner, Oregon.

Dear Friend:  
 I received your letter sometime in November and I was glad to hear from you but was really sorry not to have answered your good letter long before this. We both thank you for your interest in our work and for your good wishes and also for the news of what is going on in Turner. I was always interested in Turner and its fine people. Quite a number still write to us and we hear from the Church every now and then. As you asked me to say a few words about our work I shall and you can construct a piece for your paper from what I say and from the little leaflet I send you if you want to. We are glad and thankful to know that people there will be interested in what we are doing.

Ever since we came to Japan we have been treated very cordially by the Japanese people, in fact they are overly anxious to do a favor for us "foreigners" and especially the Americans it seems. We became acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham and their son Bob and enjoyed living with all through the first winter. In the spring of last year we were given a home in Nakano in which to live. After repairing earthquake damages we find it makes a fine home. The Yotsuya mission is at present progressing splendidly although its director is home in America on furlough. This year's report will be the best report ever made, in many ways, by the mission. The mission work is entirely evangelistic which makes it different from the work done in Japan by many other missions. We are bending every effort to win the people here to a faith in Jesus Christ so our effort is to establish churches and equip them with all the necessities possible and to open Bible Schools in as many places in Tokyo as it is found possible. At present we have six churches that are just like the churches in America except that a different language is spoken.

The Out-station Bible Schools are held in the houses of Christians and during the services the children sit on the floor in one place till the meeting is over. They are not usually divided into classes as in America but are taught by two or three teachers in succession through the story method. It is surely fine to hear them sing the Christian songs. It would do your hearts good. The Japanese ministers in our churches are the finest lot of men I think I ever knew. They are real sociable and good preachers. A great deal of emphasis is being put on the value of spiritual teaching here in Japan now and some believe that it will not be so very many years before the missionaries will not be needed as directors of the work. We will rejoice to see that day but it is not here yet and one of our own ministers said, in a reception we held for Miss Grace Farnham, of Eugene, "Please send us all the missionaries you can, we need them badly just now".

The first week of January was observed week of prayer and Saturday evening we held a union meeting that was really a spiritual dynamo of power.

We have a preacher who does nothing but preach on the streets. He preaches out every night and many of the young Christians from the different churches preach on the street also.

Christmas was very appropriately celebrated by our six churches and their 22 out of station Bible Schools with about 35 programs in all to which over 3,000 people came. Four young people were born again Christmas morning.

Prospects look bright for another year of successful work. Mrs. Isaacson and I are studying hard to get the language (full of hard knots) but we are gratified to be able to carry on even a simple conversation with the people. Later on we shall be able to do real missionary work among the people.

We thank the people of Turner for taking the interest they do in the Yotsuya Mission and in us. We want to assure you all that we do not forget you and hope you will continue to remember us.

Ralph and Bunny Isaacson. P.S.—We have three Korean Sunday Schools in Tokyo. They are the only Sunday School work being done in Tokyo for the Koreans by any mission. Also nine English Bible Classes each week, one English night school of about sixty students, three kindergartens and three special Bible Course classes.
