- 1 1/2 cups pumpkin  
 1/2 cup brown sugar  
 1/2 cup lard  
 2 eggs  
 1 cup evaporated milk  
 1/2 cup water  
 2 cups orange juice  
 1 tsp ginger  
 1 tsp cinnamon  
 1/2 tsp salt

Add the sugar and seasoning to the pumpkin, then add the slightly beaten eggs, milk and water. Stir till well blended and pour in a deep crust-lined pan. Bake at 400 degrees Fahrenheit for first 15 minutes and 200 degrees Fahrenheit for 35 minutes.

**Cauliflower au Gratin.**  
 Remove leaves and trim off the stalk from large cauliflower, leaving a solution of 1 tbsp. vinegar, 1 tsp. salt and 1 quart of water for 15 minutes to remove dirt and insects. Cook whole, steam up, to boiling salted water for seven minutes. Place cauliflower in an oiled baking dish, pour over a thin evaporated milk white sauce and cover with buttered crumbs and grated cheese. Brown in a moderate oven. This serves six.

**Cream of Tomato Soup.**  
 1 No. 2 can toma-  
 1 1/2 tsp. sugar  
 4 sprigs parsley  
 1/2 tsp. soda  
 1/2 tsp. thyme  
 1/4 bay leaf  
 1 tsp. peppercorns  
 2 cloves  
 2 slices onion  
 2 tbsp. butter  
 1/2 cup water  
 1/2 cup flour

Make a white sauce of the diluted evaporated milk, the butter and flour. Cook the tomatoes with the seasonings for five minutes and strain. There should be 3/4 cups of pulp. Add soda to pulp and combine with the hot white sauce. Pour immediately into thermos bottles.

**Whipped Cream Sauce.**  
 Three-fourths cup evaporated milk, 1 cup whipping cream, 1/2 cup powdered sugar.  
 Chill the cream and evaporated milk. Combine and whip until stiff. Fold in the sugar and keep chilled until ready to serve.

### Rank Health With Three "Rs" Is Plea

 As an educational subject for children, health should hold equal rank with the three "Rs" in the curriculum of public schools. Doctors declare that without healthy sturdy body it is impossible for the child to have a healthy, happy mind.

Neglect of childhood defects may result in permanent physical impairment later on. Many childhood ills are traceable directly to malnutrition.

High school students especially need a variety in foods for at this age their growth is rapid. The vegetable or "building food" should be abundant for high school boys and girls. When they buy their luncheons, high school pupils are apt to display a preference for chocolate sodas, cream puffs and candy. An appetizing luncheon put up at home is much to be preferred to the sort the boy or girl might obtain at the corner store near the school.

Meat is all right for the school luncheon but it should be put up in tempting form. If sliced thin it is more appetizing in sandwiches than if in thick pieces. Beverages or soups may be carried in thermos bottles but the bottles must be carefully washed and aired daily after using.

Milk is recommended for an important place in the boy's or girl's diet because of its proteins, minerals, phosphorus and calcium, necessary for the development of the body and in the case of calcium and phosphorus for the building of bone and teeth. Evaporated milk has come into favor as a health builder for children as well as adults because by removal of 99 per cent of the water it is rendered more than twice as rich in food value as ordinary milk and by a process called homogenizing more digestible than bottled market milk.

Crisp lettuce and celery, carefully washed and dried, may be so wrapped in oil paper that they will be fresh and in good condition at lunch time. Lettuce should not be used in sandwiches for wilted lettuce is almost indigestible.

### Ancient Dicing Games
