The demonstration was conducted in the Peterson filbert orchard, showing the adaptability of the Fordson for orchard work. About 15 farmers were present. Seventy-five cents per acre covered the total cost of operation, including gas, oil and labor.

SOME STREAMS CLOSED IN MARION COUNTY

Several streams of Marion County are closed for fishing for the coming season, a few of which affect this territory. The closed streams are authorized as follows: Little North Fork of the Santiam, Davis Creek, Powers Creek and Little Abiqua Creek, tributaries of the Abiqua river, Beaver Creek and Battle Creek, tributaries of Mill Creek, Brush Creek, Drift Creek and Olalla Creek. These creeks with numerous lakes are closed for fishing the coming season. These streams will be closed until April 15, 1929. Anglers should take notice that the season does not open until April 15 instead of April 1.
