NATIONAL GUARDS' SCHOOL TO OPEN FOR 4-DAY SESSION

Final preparations have been completed, it was announced Saturday by Lieutenant Colonel A. C. Baker for the school for officers of the Oregon National Guard, which will open in Portland Monday for a four-day session.

About 60 officers from all sections of the state are expected to assemble at the armory for the classes. Instruction in field and tactical work will be given at the Clackamas range.

An elaborate program of instruction has been prepared with lectures and class work on various topics pertaining to administering the affairs of a military organization, as well as handling a body of troops in the field.

The organization staff of the school is composed of Colonel Hiram U. Welch, post commander; Lieutenant Commander A. C. Baker, executive officer; Major L. A. Milner, adjutant, and Major Joseph V. Schur, quartermaster.—Oregon Journal

WILLIAM A. CARTER

The recent sale of the Shipping board boats to the Dollar Steamship Company was halted by Chas. L. McNary, U. S. Senator from Oregon. Mr. McNary caused the matter to come to a hearing before the Senate Commerce Committee on the grounds that the Emergency Fleet Corporation could not rightfully sell boats leased to a shipping company, The American Oriental Company, operating principally out of Portland, without representation on the board from the district affected. It was also brought out that there was another bid for a larger sum that was not opened.
