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A RETRACTION

Since writing our editorial on the Old Age Pension Bill we have received a copy of the bill. After reading it thoroughly we gladly change our attitude towards the bill. From what information we had of the bill it did not seem to us to be practical. It seemed to us that it would develop into a blanket proposition and that everyone past the age of 65 years could claim the pension regardless of their financial condition. If this was possible it would be a first class opportunity for graft. Careful study places the bill in a different light.

Section 6 of this bill provides that any person who has deprived him or herself of property for the sole purpose of availing themselves of the pension will be refused the same.

Section 10 provides that in case of the death of any pensioner it is found that he or she had other income or property or income capable of supporting the pensioner, double the amount of the claim shall be paid back to the county pension fund.

Upon study of the bill it seems that the sole purpose is to provide means of caring for those who have no means of support and thus make it possible for them to remain at home or with friends or relatives in place of going to the county farm or other institutions provided for their care. One of the strong arguments in favor of the Old Age Pension from five states where it has been tried out is that it does away with the county farms and the county charges are taken care of at a saving over the old way.
