FLAG DAY

June fourteenth is National Flag Day. The schools over the country will observe the occasion with appropriate exercises and it is to be hoped that there will be a more universal observance of the event than ever. Certainly the setting aside of one day to pay tribute to the American flag is appropriate. A flag in itself, of course, means nothing. It is only an object of veneration when it stands for something. The black flag and the red flag certainly do not belong in this category.

But there is every reason why the thinking and patriotic American should pay a little tribute to his country by displaying the colors of Old Glory, on June 14. For the American flag stands for something. Designed as a standard to establish liberty on the American continent, it has always stood for law and order, for freedom and justice. Under its starry folds we have grown from a struggling handful of colonies on the eastern seaboard to the most powerful and most prosperous nation on earth.

And, strange to say, although we think of our country as a comparatively new one, yet our flag is the oldest on earth in point of continuous service. All other nations have changed the design and makeup of their standards since our emblem of the stars and stripes was adopted. Some nations are a great deal older than ours, but their flags are not, and nearly all of them have made radical changes in the form of their governments since the American Constitution was adopted.

Therefore, when you honor Old Glory, remember that it is not only the most honorable but the oldest flag on earth in point of continuous service. And don't forget to display the Stars and Stripes on Flag Day.

The Eucharist services to be held in Chicago, this summer, will draw people from all parts of the world. It is the big convention of the Roman Catholic church representing the whole world. There will be representatives from Italy, the head of the "Black Shirt" organization of which the world-defier, Mussolini is the leader. It has been hinted that an effort will be made by some to remain in this country contrary to the immigration laws. It will behoove our officers to keep a sharp watch for such things that are liable to happen. It will be a rare opportunity for Mussolini to spread his doctrines in this country. He is sly and smart as has been demonstrated in his management of the settlement of the Italian debt to the United States which resulted in paying 1.1 per cent of the interest for 62 years and at the end of that time the debt was to be cancelled, and then immediately negotiate a loan from J. P. Morgan for \$10,000,000 at 7 percent interest. There may be no cause for worry but with a gathering of this kind with radically different views than ours, it will stand the American people in hand to be watchful.

Dodge of Pennsylvania, holder of a Carnegie medal for heroism, has been nominated as a candidate for the American Youth Award established by the directors of the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, which is to be held in Philadelphia from June 1 to December 1 in celebration of 150 years of American Independence. Miss Dodge, the daughter of George H. Dodge of 5244 Walton Avenue, Philadelphia, jumped into the Toms River at Ocean Gate, N. J. fully armed, and while having use of only one arm, saved the life of a drowning girl.

Elizabeth ("Betty") Clark, 13, of Cedar, Delaware, is one of that state's girl candidates for the American Youth Award, established by the directors of the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, to be held at Philadelphia from June 1 to December 1 in observance of 150 years of American Independence. If "Betty" is finally chosen to represent Delaware she will be given a week's trip to the Exposition and to Washington and the White House, where she will receive a medal from the hands of President Coolidge.
