FRANCE AND THE ARMISTICE

Ferdinand Foch, Marshall of France during the World War was practically ignored during the Armistice Day celebration in Paris. The man who laid down the terms of the armistice, the man who was in supreme command of the allied armies, the man who was acclaimed the nation's hero in 1919. In 1926 the man who made the armistice possible and who saved hundreds of thousands of lives by bringing about the cessation of hostilities, is turned down by his own countrymen. How can these things be possible? How can a nation forget her heroes. Paris not only turned down and pushed aside the greatest man of France but she refused to display the American flag along with the flags of the allied nations who fought side by side during the world war. In this country where the allied colors were shown on armistice day, the French tricolor had its rightful place among the allied flags. France is paving the way toward losing the friendship of the United States by her Anti-American spirit.

GERVAIS STAR GRIEVES OVER TURNER PRECINCT

The editor of the Gervais Star seems to have some sort of a "Fatherly Interest" in Turner precinct. In last week's issue of the Star he mourns over the fact that Turner precinct went Democratic. He made a statement to the effect that Turner has great possibilities lying at her very door. He said that with the country around Turner suitable for raising vegetables the town should have a cannery. He was right. With the wide acreage of land suitable for diversified farming, there is no reason why Turner should not be able to support a cannery that would mean a good payroll for the town. One great advantage Turner has over the other small towns in the Santiam Valley is that she is on the main line of the S. P. The market roads leading out of Turner east and west should be another factor in the development of the canning industry in Turner. Both roads go through land that is suitable vegetable and fruit raising land. A cannery capable of handling both fruit and vegetables would not only care for the crops that are now raised but would encourage additional acreage.

THANKSGIVING

December 21, 1620, the Pilgrims landed on the shores of Cape Cod and founded the first colony in New England.
