JOHN M. WATSON, SR.

John M. Watson, Oregon pioneer and Civil War veteran, was born on April 1, 1848, at Beaver Falls, Indiana, and died at his home in Turner, Oregon, April 5, 1921, aged 78 years, 11 months and 28 days.

He came to Oregon from Finlay, Ohio, and has resided in Marion County ever since.

He served in the Civil War during 1864-65. He enlisted in Co. K, 108th Ohio Infantry, was honorably discharged at Charlotte, N.C. He was a member of Pearl Lodge, No. 66, A. F. & A. M., Turner, Ore., and Sedgwick Post No. 10 G.A.R., Salem, Ore.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. E. J. Watson, three daughters, Mrs. E. L. Martin, Lewiston, Ida.; Mrs. S. L. Tunnell, Winona, Ida.; and Mrs. A. E. Freeden, of Portland, Ore. Two sons, W. B. Watson, Boring, Ore., and John M. Watson, Jr., of Turner, Oregon.

Funeral services will be held at Rigdon's Parlors, Thursday, 2 p.m., and Masonic Ceremonies, Friday at Twin Oak Cemetery, Turner, Ore.
