LEGISLATORS' PAY AMENDMENT

On page 12 in the voter's pamphlet appears the argument against the amendment to raise the pay of the members of the legislature. This argument is given by three members of the last legislature. It is an argument that savors of true patriotism to the state. It is signed by Representatives Paulson of the 4th district; Chindgren, of the 16th district, and Norvell of the 23rd district.

"The compensation of the members of the legislature is admittedly small and apparently inadequate. However, considering the sense of pride, motive and duty to the wholesome desire of citizens to serve to promote the advancement of the state of Oregon, the present compensation is sufficient."

They have sounded a note of sacrifice to an ideal. It is only through a determination to serve to the best interests of the state that makes their service worthwhile. When they go there with an axe to grind for themselves or some interests with which they are interested they not only lower the value of their service but they lose the regard of the citizens of the state.

"The proposed rise in compensation to \$10 per diem will tend to commercialize both branches of the legislature, and will be an incentive to promote the candidacy of men and women who may have no special motive or ambition to serve the state except the desire to receive said remuneration as proposed in this amendment."

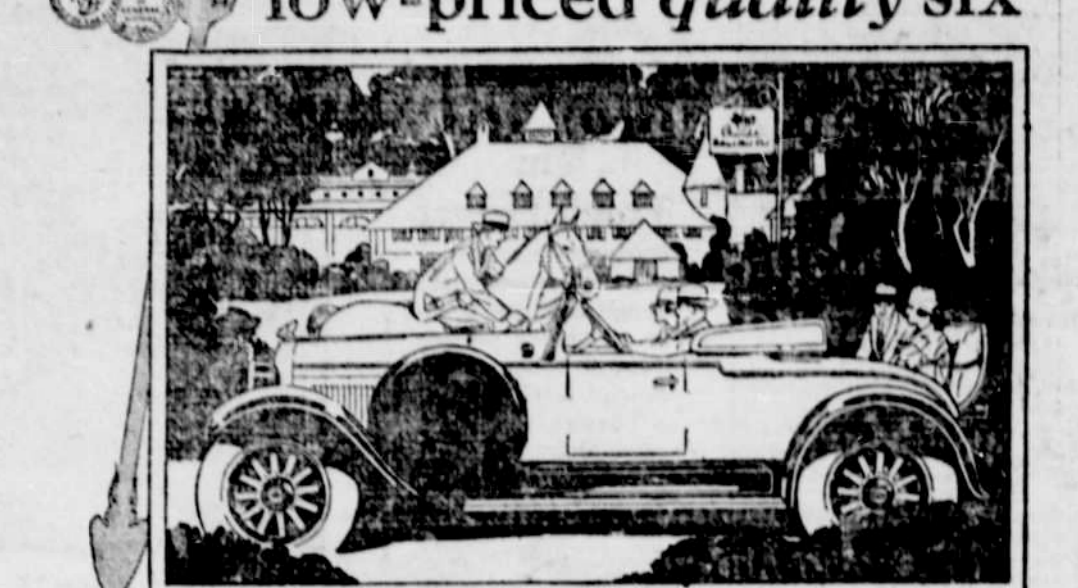

FLAX OUTLOOK GOOD

The flax outlook, for this section, is good this year. Indications point to one of the best yields this year the farmers have ever had. Samples taken from flax grown by O. P. Given June 12 measured 39 inches. A sample taken from the same location in the field June 19, one week later, was 46 inches in length, showing a growth of nine inches. Mr. Given has ten acres of this flax which he estimates will yield about three tons to the acre. Another sample pulled from a field of about the same size adjoining the first one measured 36 inches. This sample was pulled June 19th and had been planted but six weeks. The season has been ideal for this crop and the farmers should realize a goodly profit this year.

BY-LAWS OF THE TURNER TELEPHONE COMPANY
