After four hundred years of misrule, kept in a constant turmoil by repeated revolutions, with the people having no principal to fight for except to fight for the side that would pay them the most money, Mexico is beginning to awaken along lines of education and national unity. Since a year ago last July the Mexican government has established public schools that are accommodating nearly 4,000,000 children. Unprejudiced visitors in Mexico tell us that President Calles' following is growing steadily all the time. The people are beginning to see the benefits to be derived from the schools and colleges being established by the government. There are beginning to see that there is something better ahead of them than ignorance and living in one room mud huts. Mexico is one of the richest countries on the American continent in potential wealth, and when the average Mexican gets the encouragement from his government to develop this wealth it will advance rapidly and will be able to take its place as one of the foremost nations of the earth.

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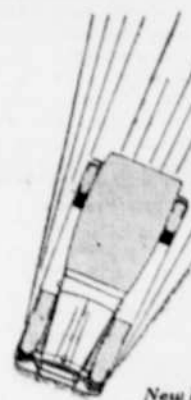

REV. U. S. CROWDER SPEAKS AT TURNER

In spite of the stormy weather last Sunday night more than fifty people gathered at the Methodist church to greet the Rev. U. S. Crowder, and enjoy the address delivered by him from that pulpit. Bro. Crowder spoke from the subject: "Religious and Economic Conditions in Mexico." He spent six weeks in our sister republic in an endeavor to learn the facts as they really were. He told some of the things that President Calles is endeavoring to do. One of the great things he has done is to establish a public school system similar to our own system of education.

The speaker told us among other things that there were 30,000,000 people in that country, with 11,000,000 legal voters. Two percent of those voters are able to read their name and only 1 percent of the two percent can write their name. When the law went into effect that all preachers and teachers were native born and the other 95 percent were natives of Spain, Germany, Italy and Poland. Touching on the public school system of Mexico Mr. Crowder said that in an interview with the minister of education of one of the border states he said that there were 4,000,000 children in public schools since a year ago last July. In touching on the general conditions of Mexico Mr. Crowder said the Mexicans had been victims of misrule for 400 years but that a new day was dawning. With the class of men who are leaders of the country he predicted that Mexico will rise out of her sleep and become one of the great countries on the American continent.
