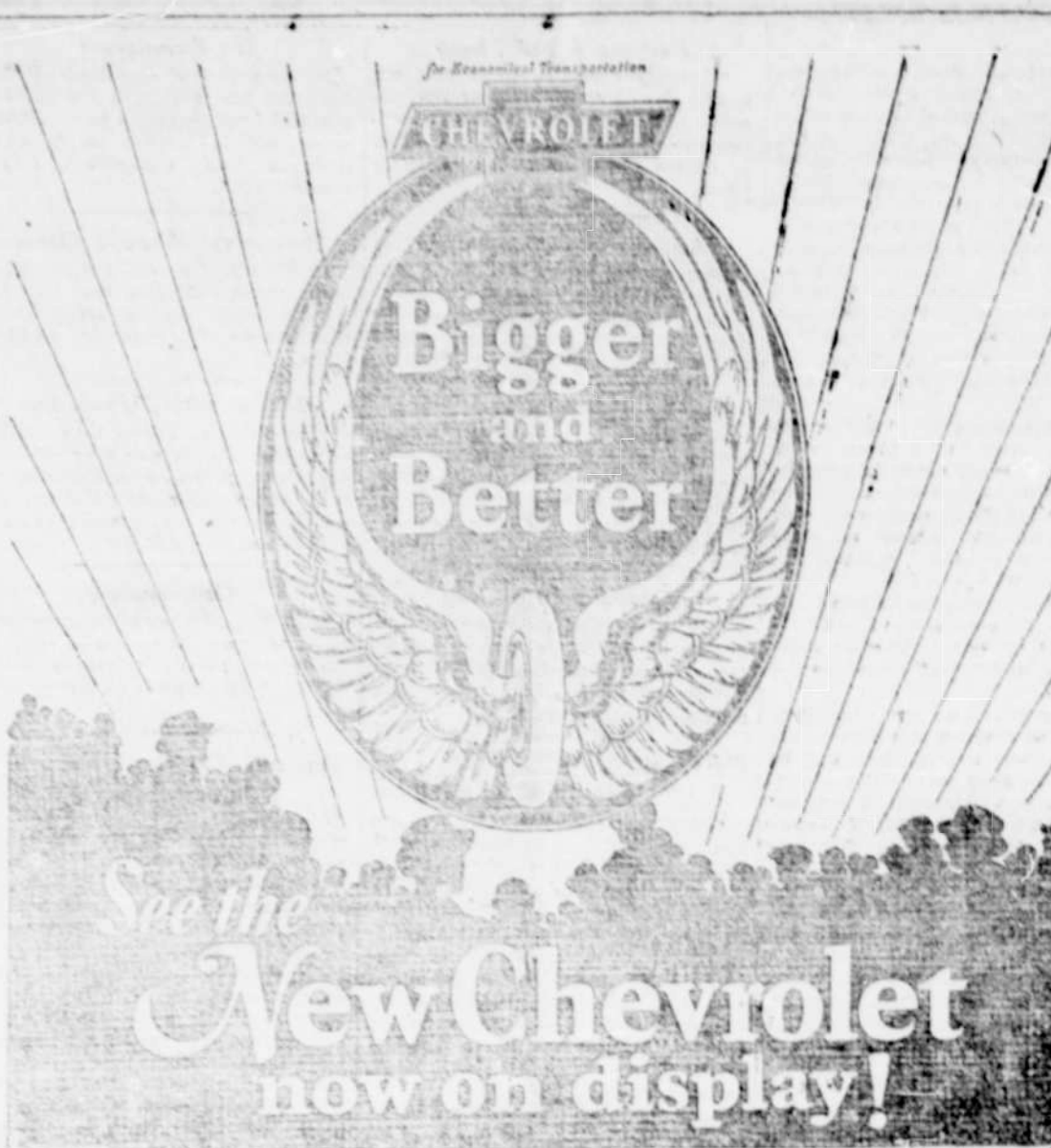
That the plaintiff is the owner, in fee simple, and is in possession of all of the following described lands and premises, to-wit: Beginning at the Southeast corner

MEMORIAL HOME DEDICATED

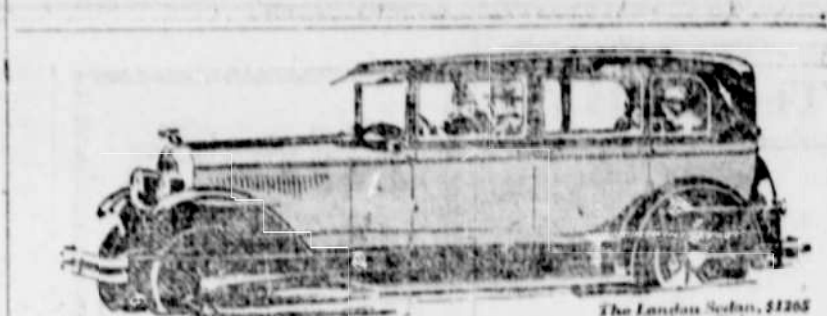
