## GLENN L. MILLER

Glenn L. Miller was born at Turner, Oregon, October 24, 1900. He graduated from the Turner high school in 1918. In 1920 he entered Oregon Agricultural College, where he took up the study of Civil Engineering. Graduating 1924 he secured employment with the State Highway Commission, which place he held until his death. He was connected most of the time, with the Roosevelt Highway construction. He rose rapidly in his line of work and was given places of greater responsibility as he earned them. He endeared himself to all by his goodnatured friendliness to all who knew him.

He was a member of the Lambda Phi Lambda honorary fraternity, also the Elks Lodge, of Marshfield. Glenn met his death in an automobile accident near Reedsport, Oregon, Saturday, June 30, 1928. Funeral services were held from the Rigdon Chappel, in Salem, Thursday July 5, with burial in Twin Oak cemetery, at Turner. The funeral was conducted by James Pointer, a minister of the Christian church, who was an old friend. His former schoolmates and friends bore him to his last resting place. Besides his parents and other relatives he leaves scores of friends who feel the loss of a good friend.
