Mrs. Girardin, who has been in Salem for some time for medical treatment, is much improved and back at her apartment in the G. W. Farris home.

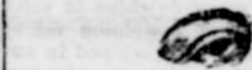

HENRY L. EARL

Henry L. Earl was born in Canada, June 26, 1857. He came to Oregon with his parents, Philip and Charlotte Earl, when he was four years old and settled on a farm in Polk county. Later he located in Turner, Oregon, where he opened a hardware store. He was married to Amy Day, by whom he had three children, Archie, now of California; Venita (Mrs. A. C. Wintermute), of Monmouth, Oregon; Geneva (Mrs. H. L. Harper), who passed to life eternal two years ago.

After the death of Mrs. Amy Earl, April 10, 1898, Mrs. Earl married, three and one-half years later, Miss Clara Hilliary, who died eighteen months later. Mr. Earl again married, taking Mrs. Rachel Barker for his third wife, who now survives him. Mr. Earl's marriage to Mrs. Barker was in 1905, two and one-half years after the death of his wife Clara.

Mr. Earl was a man of highest Christian character and was beloved by all who knew him. Mr. Earl suffered a slight stroke on July 22, succumbing to others one week later. Mrs. Earl left for the East July 9, feeling that Mr. Earl was apparently in good health, when a wire came that he had been stricken and before Mrs. Earl could reach him he had passed away. Accordingly to request of Mrs. Earl, arrangements for the funeral were held up until she returned which was Friday, August 3. On Sunday, August 5, the last sad rites took place at the Methodist church in Turner. Rev. Mr. Chambers, of Salem, and Rev. M. A. Groves, of Turner, officiating. Interment was at Twin Oak cemetery.
