Oregon News In Brief

Plans are ordered for the new Capital View hotel, to cost \$350,000. The building will be located in Salem and will be built by Salem Capital.

The Weyerhaeuser Lumber company have commenced work on an extensive milling project in the Klamath Falls district.

Lincoln County has a crusher running 24 hours a day crushing rock for the Philomath road.

The Pleasant Valley cheese factory, near Tillamook, recently burned will be rebuilt.

The state flax plant is receiving heavy shipment of 1928 flax. A large percent of it is coming from the Turner and West Stayton sections.

The dredge Clackamas pumps river clay two miles to Swan Island airfield. This will be one of Oregon's finest airports.

The 757 acre Kahlagen ranch, near Roseburg has been sold for a sheep and turkey farm.

Citizens of Baker have already subscribed \$96,000 towards a \$150,000 hotel.

The government will establish a new Meteorological station in Salem.

Douglas county will form a pool for the selling of 12,000 Turkeys, and Lane County farmers will organize for the sale of 3100 birds.

Stock is being subscribed for a \$2,500,000 Fir-Tex Insulating Board plant to be erected at St. Helens.

The salmon fishing industry brought a return to St. Helens fishermen; of \$40,000.

The Malheur County Court has leased 10,000 acres of land to an oil exploration company.

The \$500,000 Memorial building at O. A. C. is nearly completed.

RETURNED MISSIONARY SPEAKS

Mr. Leslie Whittaker a returned missionary of the Baptist church spoke at the Methodist church Sunday morning to an appreciative audience. He spoke at length on the geographical setting of the country of Burmah, where he is located. He said Burmah was potentially rich and did not suffer from famine as did India, proper, and where any section should be in distress the country was able to go to their aid. The lower end of the country is in the rain belt and has 200 inches of rain annually, while upper Burmah only has 20 inches and has to rely on irrigation. He gave the size of the country as 1500 miles long and 500 miles wide. The missionary efforts are principally left to the Baptists who number 62 1-2 percent of the christian population. Adoniram Judson was the first Baptist missionary to work in foreign fields, and went to Burmah sometime about 1800 and worked years for one convert which was the beginning of the Baptist work in Burmah.
